Northwood Hills Among the Best (We Knew It All Along!)

Northwood Hills was among three Far North Dallas neighborhoods that received the highest overall scores within the Dallas city limits, in a Dallas Morning News study to determine the "Best Neighborhoods."

Using numerical analysis in an attempt to measure livability as far as possible, The News looked at 11 issues that

residents said in a survey were most important to them. Those criteria ranged from safety, ease of commute, friendly neighbors and school quality to walkability, property appreciation, landscaping and affordability.



The Prestonwood area ranked first, although for the purposes of the survey,

that designation included nearby neighborhoods.

The Northwood Hills area ranked second in the News analysis, standing out as a safe neighborhood near a variety of places to go and things to do. The neighborhood was also described as "quiet and well-kept." The Bent Tree-Oakdale-Country Brook area was ranked third.

Watering: The New Normal

In April 2012, the Dallas City Council made the twice-a-week watering schedule permanent, as well as the before 10 a.m. and after 6 p.m. rule. Those restrictions – which used to be "Stage 1" of the City's drought contingency plan -- are now our "normal."

Residential and commercial customers with street addresses ending in an even number can use automatic irrigation systems or hose-end sprinklers on Sundays and Thursdays before 10 a.m. and after 6 p.m. Those customers with addresses ending in an odd number can do the same on Saturdays and Wednesdays. The restrictions only affect automatic irrigation systems and hose-end sprinklers. Drip irrigation, soaker hoses and hand-watering are permitted at any time, on any day.

The City is revising the drought contingency plan to provide for a new Stage 1 and additional restriction stages. Meanwhile, Code Compliance officers will strictly enforce the two-day schedule and restricted times. Residents caught watering outside the guidelines will get one warning, and then a \$250 fine on the second offense.


We've also learned that Code officers DO NOT have to actually see the offense; they are trained to observe water residue, run-off and other tell-tale signs of recent watering. On page 16 you'll find a watering schedule and bulk trash collection schedule, ready to clip and save for reference.

The Early Bird Gets the Citation


Many neighbors put bulk trash out on the curb too early in April and May. When one resident -- or their landscape crew – puts out trash or bags, others assume it's the correct week...and the problem snowballs down the block.

For Northwood Hills, bulk collection happens sometime during the week of the SECOND MONDAY of each month.

As a reminder, NHHA places two dozen signs in the neighborhood the Thursday before trash week – the first day it is legal to put items on the curb. And, you can clip the box on the back of this (and every) issue of The Breeze. It's an easy way to keep collection dates – and watering days – handy... AND avoid a citation from Code Compliance.

Water Restrictions: Are We In for More?

Despite recent rains, North Texas remains in a moderate drought. As of May 22, the lakes from which Dallas gets its water (Ray Roberts, Lewisville, Grapevine, Ray Hubbard, Tawakoni and Fork) are depleted 18.43 percent. This is below the depletion level that would trigger additional measures under the current drought contingency plan (which is being revised). As summer heat increases, what criteria trigger additional watering restrictions?

Low water supply

Water demand approaches system capacity

Short-term deficiencies limit supply capability

Contamination

As this issue of The Breeze goes to press, Dallas Water Utilities officials anticipate further water restrictions may not be needed until August.

Mosquitoes Are Here

Recent rains have provided excellent conditions for mosquitoes to breed. One severe case of West Nile virus has been confirmed in North Texas. Your best prevention is to eliminate standing water. If that's not possible, use organic mosquito dunks – small, inexpensive donuts that are harmless to pets and people and prevent mosquitoes from breeding.

Parade Guidelines

As you plan your family's participation in the July 4th Parade, please note the following guidelines that help us ensure a fun and safe event for everyone.

The parade line-up order is organized with the input of Dallas Police, and will be enforced by officers working the parade. The goal is to separate large, motorized entries from smaller entries; to keep children away from cars; and to put fastermoving entries to the front while slower entries can move at their own pace.

The parade begins with motorized vehicles – including cars, trucks, pulled trailers (floats), and motorcycles. The next group is non-motorized entries – bikes, scooters, Big Wheels, strollers, walkers and battery-operated kiddie-cars. Organized groups (scout troop, church group, for example) lead this section, followed by individuals and families.

Children (on bikes, trikes or walking) are not permitted to accompany vehicle entries. Kids on bikes are not permitted to weave in and out, moving ahead into the motorized vehicle section. NHHA is required by the City to hire Dallas Police officers to enforce these safety guidelines.



Parental Sentinels

Humans aren't the only ones who know Northwood Hills is a great place to have a family! Residents on Meadowcreek, both east and west of Hillcrest, eagerly watch for the return of the Yellow-crowned Night Herons each year.

These small herons winter on the Gulf and Atlantic coasts, and their breeding ground extends from southern New England south to Florida and along the Mississippi River. They often nest in colonies, usually on platforms of sticks in trees or shrubs, and lay three to five pale blue-green eggs.

However, their preferred habitat typically is more marsh-like than Northwood Hills, so it's a treat and a compliment they return to the area each year.





Oak Wilt Update

Northwood Hills is a hot spot for deadly oak wilt fungus. Your oak trees are a valuable asset to your property.

It is NOT SAFE to prune oak trees now. Traditionally the danger period ends mid-June, but late rains and cool temperatures can extend that date. For the safety of your own trees, please delay pruning until mid-summer.

NHHA's consulting arborist Alan Johnson with Holcomb Tree Service says, "In Northwood Hills this year, we recommend delaying pruning oaks until August 2013 through mid-February of 2014."

Springing Forward to 2013 – Northwood Hills Real Estate

What a difference a year makes. The market is making quite a rebound! Year-to-date sales in Northwood Hills (as of 4/30/2013) have reached 25, as compared to just 16 for the same period in 2012. Active inventory is down from 26 homes on the market at this time last year, to just 17 as this issue of The Breeze goes to press.

With more buyers in the market than homes available, demand outweighs supply, and prices have started to rise. However, when we look at the statistics of the SOLD homes in Northwood Hills through April 2013, the sold prices ranged in value from \$222,500 - \$840,000, at an average of \$130.94/sq ft, which is actually down from \$132.75/ft in 2012. The days on market (DOM) are down from 129 days in 2012, to 122 days this year. There were eight homes that sold in less than two weeks, and five listings that took over 265 days to sell.

So what is really going on in the current market?

Buyers are relying heavily on the Internet, as well as phone apps, to get instant information on any and all houses they think might be of interest to them. Pictures are becoming more important, as the price of professional photography has become very competitive. Within 24 hours your listing agent can have 25 photos for MLS, blended using programs like Photoshop to get just the right amount of light in each room, maximizing your home's assets and amenities.

The homes that are "done to the nines" are generating multiple interest and offers and selling within days of hitting the market, for at-or-above asking price. On the other hand, the homes that are perceived as needing work, and perhaps not priced to make sense for most buyers to take on "the project," are sitting. We know that the longer a home is on the market, the less it is worth. So we have this dichotomy going on. On the one hand, we have this very, very hot market. And on the other, we have a market that that is getting very little activity. I get calls every day from realtors who have buyers looking for homes in our neighborhood, among continued page 12


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others. They say they have seen everything on the market, and ask if I know of anything that might be hitting the market in the near future.


