Member dues also fund professional landscaping, tree pruning and irrigation of 10 median areas that are branded gateways, as well as periodic new plantings and seasonal color.

Through communications with Members via MemberMail and Security Snapshot on civic, community, neighborhood, crime and even resident-specific concerns, NHHA is a valued source of relevant, current information, and also provides ongoing education about West Nile virus, bulk trash collection and oak wilt.



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interior design, florals, and more. Dal-Rich's new Richardson Mercantile store is run by the same company that has a similar outlet in Frisco. Frisco Mercantile opened in 2009.

Dal-Rich was one of the first large retail centers in Dallas' northern suburbs. Announced in 1963, it was built by Richardson's pioneer Stults family, which had owned the land since 1873. Dallas developers Hugh Prather and Charles Brown were partners in the project. Famed Dallas architect George Dahl did the original design.

In 1972, the shopping center was sold by the Stults. The anchors back then included grocer Safeway, Hubbard's Cafeteria and TG&Y Variety Store. Over the years, Dal-Rich was expanded and remodeled several times, and now has Spanish-style architecture.



SVUMC Pre-School Considers Transitional Kindergarten Class

Since 1963 Spring Valley United Methodist Church (SVUMC) Preschool has been a well-known resource for Northwood Hills parents, providing curriculumbased instruction in a family-style setting for children age one through pre-school.

Now, in response to parent request, SVUMC Preschool is considering a "Transitional Kindergarten" class for the 2015-2016 year. This class would be tailored to children born in the summer – "young" five-year-olds – whose parents might be considering delaying kindergarten a year, as well as for those born in September/early Fall who would have just missed the cut-off date of September 1.

"The transitional kindergarten does not replace a kindergarten year," says SVUMC Preschool Director Amy Gutmann. "It is an extra year of preschool with a greater focus on academics for the older children who are ready. Those children would still attend kindergarten the following year."

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DPD Crime Stats Update

For several years NHHA
Members have enjoyed receiving
a monthly Security Snapshot
via MemberMail, detailing the
criminal incidents reported to
Dallas Police in the previous 30
days. These reports roll up to
the comprehensive analysis we
present at each year's NHHA
Annual Meeting.

Crime & Security Chair Judy Switzer compiles the Snapshot after reviewing crime reports from several sources, including incident reports through DPD and two private reporting services. She also follows up personally with NHHA Members who have had incidents to gain information that could help deter additional crime.

On June 1, DPD launched a new records management system and since then there have been problems in the way reports are logged, stored and accessed; information privacy concerns; and discrepancies/corrupted data in how incidents are coded.

Bottom line, NHHA Security Snapshots have been suspended until we can access reliable, credible police reports that include enough information and context to accurately report and track criminal incidents.

Northwood Hills Resident to Lead Governor's Task Force on Infectious Diseases

Northwood Hills resident Dr. Brett Giroir has been tapped by Texas Governor Rick Perry to oversee the Texas Task Force on Infectious Disease Preparedness and Response. Dr. Giroir is CEO of Texas A&M Health Science Center, and will lead the new task force to ensure the state appropriately responds to infectious diseases like the Ebola virus.

Dr. Giroir is a recognized American biomedical researcher, and as Director of the Defense Sciences Offices of the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency (DARPA) in Arlington, Virginia, guided a variety of biodefense and biosecurity research projects related to biological weapons decontamination, countermeasures to biological threats, vaccines and treatments for emerging diseases and agents of bioterrorism.

Last year he appeared before the House Armed Services Committee Subcommittee on Intelligence, Emerging Threats and Capabilities hearing on Biodefense: Worldwide Threats and Countermeasure Efforts for the Department of Defense.

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Real Estate Report

As the fall Breeze goes to press, the market for homes in Northwood Hills remains strong! While the number of SOLD listings through September 30, 2014 is 52, and during the same period last year there were 67 SOLD properties, all indications are that the market is actually stronger than it was a year ago.

The average SOLD price realized a year-over-year increase of 10 percent, from \$514,174 to \$566,256. Average dollars/foot were up from \$138.01/sqft to \$151.30/sqft. The average CDOM (Continuous Days on Market) dropped from 82 one year ago to just 66 for the same period in 2014.

Lot values have increased as well. Last year, the average half-acre lot was selling for approximately \$385,000. This year a similar lot would go for approximately \$415,000.

The strength of our market is due in large part to what is happening around us. In other words, the values south of LBJ have also increased. In many cases, purchasers come to Northwood Hills when they have been priced out of other markets. For example, south of LBJ you cannot find an

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interior, treed half-acre lot for anywhere near \$400K. While some buyers may perceive the location south of the loop to be more desirable, it becomes a matter of dollars and cents. The general rule of thumb is that the lot investment usually ends up being 25-30 percent of a buyer's investment in the total (lot + improvement).

Keep in mind, buyers are much more educated than ever before. With Internet access to hundreds of real estate sites, most of which are equipped with dozens of pictures of the homes for sale, Google maps, neighborhood-specific sites, independent school district sites with attendance zone maps, and city, county and TEA (Texas Education Agency) sites, buyers are extremely knowledgeable when they begin their search.

"There will be a phone call, and I will get it. It may be a bioterrorism attack, or a radiation cloud, or a new flu strain capable of causing pandemic."
