### Early Characters in NWH History

These stories stem from John's sit-down with Bill Stanley, an original homeowner in Northwood Hills Estates. The first article in the series was published in the Spring 2021 edition of the Breeze.

In 1966 a good friend of Bill's was Norman Brinker, widely known as the godfather of the restaurant industry. When Bill knew him, Norm had just started Steak & Ale. Norm was married to former tennis star Maureen "Little Mo" Connolly who won nine grand slam titles in the 1950s. Bill and Mo became friends due to their tennis connection. Discussing Norman's success in the restaurant business, Bill thought he might start a chain himself. Norm told Bill he knew he could be successful, so Bill opened the Hungry Jockey at Preston and Forest. The Hungry Jockey became a Dallas institution, especially for breakfast in the late 1960s. Bill came to know several Dallas Cowboys players who frequented the restaurant. Lots of deals were done in booths at his restaurant over breakfast and lunch by Dallas "movers and shakers," some of which lived in Northwood Hills. One such patron was Tex Roberts.

Tex purchased an old farm house sitting on a ten-acre estate at the end of Spring Valley at the creek. The farm house is long gone and today the Valley House Gallery & Sculpture Garden sits in its place. Tex and his so-called "aunt" lived in the farm house (Tex's ex-wife and his nieces said he did not

have an aunt). He was very wealthy and quite an eccentric. No one was quite sure what Tex did for a living, but they knew he was smart and fearless. Bill came to know Tex at the Hungry Jockey because he would come in day after day and sit for hours drinking coffee and reading the stock reports in the newspaper. He apparently only had a seventh-grade education, but still read business publications all the time and had a near photographic memory.



After being alerted to Tex's long visits by his manager, Bill asked Tex to either buy something or limit his time to an hour. Tex grumbled, but complied. The Hungry Jockey was small and Bill could not afford to have a booth tied up most of the day with one person just drinking coffee.

The Hungry Jockey quickly grew in popularity. In those days, there was no internet or even credit cards; everyone paid with cash. Bill hired good managers to run the restaurant, but they got greedy and the restaurant started experiencing profit issues. When Bill noticed a cash discrepancy, he fired the manager and thought his issues were behind him. Unfortunately, there were other problems. The owner of the clothing store adjacent to The Hungry Jockey told him he was coming to collect the first of 123 free lunches promised by that former manager in return for two suits. Bill had to break it to him that there would not be any free lunches. Another time Bill was reviewing the books and noticed the price of beef had seemingly skyrocketed. When he inquired about it, he did not get a very clear explanation. After a little detective work, Bill found out that the current manager was ordering more beef than necessary and selling the excess to his friends. Out goes manager number two. It was then Bill decided the restaurant that had been such a success was not worth the time and aggravation he was experiencing. Since he could not be there full time himself, he sold the Dallas institution.

About a year after the sale of The Hungry Jockey, Tex and his "aunt," Jessie Forsyth, vanished mysteriously from their mansion on Spring Valley. Roberts' ample fortune disappeared as well. The Tex Roberts affair was one of the most bizarre missing persons cases on record at the time and certainly the most famous in Northwood Hills.

Tex was a very secretive man with a murky past. He was born Leroy Robert Sevier in Vermont. He lived in Detroit in the 30s and 40s, making enemies in labor disputes, and changed his name once coming to Dallas. He killed a man in a fight with communists in Detroit. In danger from past enemies, Tex always carried a gun.

The mysterious disappearance began on the night of August 15, 1970, when Roberts summoned his friend and bodyguard Al Bergeron concerning a matter of "utmost importance." Bergeron went to the residence and found the usually locked front door ajar but no one home (Tex kept no servants). It was not unusual for the 85-year-old Roberts to leave the house suddenly, but it was virtually unprecedented for continued page 4

### **Bulk Trash Etiquette**

Bulk trash pick-up begins on the SECOND MONDAY of the month. You are allowed to place items out beginning the Thursday before, and no later than 7am on the Monday collection begins. It may take the city a few days to get to your street, so don't be surprised if your items aren't picked up immediately.

Brush and bulky trash must be placed just behind the curb line in front of your home. Do not place items in the street or on the sidewalk. Do not place items within 5 feet of a mailbox, fence, wall, water meter, fire hydrant, utility pole, traffic sign, or parked car. Lastly, do not place items in front of a vacant lot or in any of NHHA's medians.

Make sure you are bagging everything that can be bagged so that items don't blow into your neighbor's yard or become enticing to critters. It isn't the policy of NHHA to "call code" on offenders, but complaints are easy to file thanks to the City's 311 app. Any resident can anonymously report an offense on their smartphone and include a picture. Even first-time violations can carry a hefty fine.

Don't tempt fate – or your neighbors. Follow the set-out rules, clip and refer to the bulk trash collection schedule on the back page of this newsletter, and look for the monthly signs placed throughout the neighborhood as collection week approaches.

89-year-old Jessie Forsyth to accompany him. After waiting several hours for Roberts to return, Bergeron called police.

Tex and Jessie were victims of a scheme to wrest control of their estates through fraudulent powers of attorney. Two men were later convicted in the case – a lawyer for forging the documents and a notary for certifying them. Both men died in prison as a result of other crimes of extortion. While no proof exists, the prevailing view is they killed Roberts and Forsyth. The police even spoke to the famous and controversial psychic Peter Hurkos to help with the case. Tex's and Jessie's bodies were never recovered.

Once he was declared dead, there was a battle over his wills. In one will, Tex seemingly left his only child, daughter Yvonne, \$1. The IRS was also after him for \$96,000 in back taxes between 1964-1968. A compromise was ultimately reached between all the parties and Yvonne received \$81,000 from the estate.

Tex was not the only character in the early days of Northwood Hills. Bob Merit built the original home at 6607 Meadowcreek in 1966. Bob was quite the promoter and a bit of an eccentric. Bill would often see Bob watering his yard continued page 5

continued from page 4 with a hose in a 3 piece suit wearing alligator slippers. Bob began the "Paco Taco" chain. His first Paco Taco sat where Roman Cucina is today, which utilizes the original Paco Taco structure. Another Northwood Hills Estates neighbor and close friend of Bill's was Ed Norton. Ed was the CFO of Taylor Publishing for 14 years before becoming a very successful banker and rancher (officer of the Brangus Breeders Association). According to Bill, Ed loaned Bob a lot of money for his restaurant chain, but unfortunately, Bob left town with the money and was never heard from again.

### Pace of Growth Continues Even as Home Sales Dip in June

North Texas area home sales went down in June, but the pace of growth continues to soar. Area home sales were down 3% in June from a year ago, but June 2021 sales were higher than sales in June 2019. The area median home sales price rose 23% in June to \$350,000. Prices of single family homes sold by agents are up 18% through June, compared to the same period last year. Supply and demand continues to drive the market, with a near-historic low number of homes for sale in the area at the end of June. A continuing trend is that houses are selling higher than asking price.

Businesses and people continue to migrate to DFW to escape high taxes and expensive real estate markets. Economists at Oxford Economics expect Dallas to be one of the biggest beneficiaries in the next couple of years.

Builders can't keep up with the strong demand for new homes. The cost of building has gone up across the board. Costs of materials and labor have been rising 3%-4%monthly the previous two years. The price of lumber continued page 11

has jumped 6 times in the last 15 months. Is higher priced lumber the new normal? Lumber market experts think so at least for the next couple of years. Strong demand and lack of new mills will probably keep lumber prices above the prepandemic levels for at least 1-2 years. As new home prices rise, pre-owned homes become a better value.

Our Northwood Hills neighborhood is in great demand and we are doing fantastic. In the second quarter alone there were 24 sales and 9 sold for over asking price! The sales prices ranged from \$538,500 to \$2,690,000 and price per square foot from \$157 to \$357 with an average price per square foot of \$246, compared to \$210 in 2020 Q2. Average days on the market was an amazing 17 days, in contrast to 52 days in 2020 (during the shutdown) and 27 days in 2019. Average sales price this quarter was \$1,137,000, including 11 homes selling for over \$1 million with 3 homes selling for over \$2 million. Year to date (January through June) there have been 40 home sales versus 27 home sales in 2020 for the same time period. As we go to press there are 5 Active listings and 7 homes Under Contract.

Northwood Hills homes continue to be highly desirable for families and working professionals who enjoy the beauty and convenience of our neighborhood. Low inventory and low mortgage rates also continue to make it a good time to be a seller. Contact your trusted real estate professional to find out if it is a good time for you to sell.



### Watch Your Car

Through the first 6 months of 2021, Northwood Hills experienced 21 criminal incidents. Of those, 10 involved vehicles. That's nearly half! Thefts of vehicles and vehicle accessories and burglaries of motor vehicles are typically quick crimes of opportunity. Sometimes homeowners take for granted the importance of securing their automobiles, especially when they think they'll be "in and out in a jiffy!" - Lock your car at all times
- Keep windows rolled up

- Remind contractors to secure their vehicles
- If you have to park outside overnight, park in a well-lit location and don't leave garage door openers in the car



### **Stop the Spread**

It's hard to step outside for even a moment these days without getting a visit from a mosquito or two. The familiar resulting itch lets you know you've been a target! To deter mosquitoes, remember the Four D's:

- DEET: Use insect repellants that contain DEET or other EPA-approved repellants. Whenever you're outside, even for a short time, protect yourself.
- DRESS: Wear long, loose, light-colored clothing when outside.
- DRAIN: Remove any standing water. Change water in birdbaths, fountains and plant saucers often. Clean gutters so leaves can't hold moisture. Use mosquito dunks where necessary.
- DUSK/DAWN: Consider staying indoors during dusk and dawn hours when mosquitoes are most active.

All mosquitoes need water to reproduce, so the best thing you can do on your own property to prevent breeding and the spread of West Nile Virus is to eliminate standing water. The worst offenders are unkempt swimming pools, stagnant ponds, birdbaths, empty containers that collect rainwater, clogged gutters, and French drains. If you can't empty the water, use a mosquito dunk. NHHA recently offered free mosquito dunks to members at the Annual Shred Event. Become continued page 15


### The Cove Aquatic Center
