Early Characters in NWH History

These stories stem from John's sit-down with Bill Stanley, an original homeowner in Northwood Hills Estates. The first article in the series was published in the Spring 2021 edition of the Breeze.

Bill Stanley's son Scott attended Northwood Hills Elementary in the early 1970s. His best friend in 6th grade was Phil Terry, son of Kenn Terry on Meadowhaven. The boys played baseball and basketball together, coached by their fathers. On Tuesday, February 20, 1973 at 9:30am, Northwood Hills Elementary was notified by a man pretending to be Kenn Terry, that he was sending a friend to pick his son Phil up for an orthodontist appointment. Kenn was the president of First Bank and Trust of Richardson (located at Spring Valley and Central) and the imposter told the office he was sending a friend because he could not personally break away from the bank to pick up Phil.

At the scheduled time, Phil saw what he thought was his Dad's car and came outside the school. However, while the car looked exactly like his father's, it was actually a rental which George Braddock Ogle II ("Brad") had procured to confuse Phil. Once Phil got to the car, Brad, wearing a ski mask and brandishing a revolver, pulled him inside and duct taped his eyes closed, pushing him into the back seat. Amazingly for a young child, Phil kept his composure and counted the turns the car made as it left the school until it arrived at the Comanche Springs Inn (located at Spring Valley and Central near Texas Instruments). Once the car came to a stop, Phil counted the steps it took to get from the car to the motel room.

The kidnapper Brad called Kenn's office and demanded \$250,000 in old bills of small denomination be placed in two brown paper bags. Kenn was given ten minutes to comply or Phil would be killed. Kenn was only able to raise \$56,000 without causing undue attention in the 7 minutes he had remaining to get to the drop spot. Beyond the money, Kenn's bigger issue was trying to find the required transport items at the bank; "have you ever tried to find a brown paper bag in a bank?" After placing the money in bags, he drove to the drop spot, left the money, and returned to the bank. The kidnapper told him nothing would happen to his son if he complied and he would get a call when Phil was free. About 20 minutes later, Phil was driven to Prestonwood

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Elementary as the school day was ending and released into a crowd of kids going home. Phil immediately ran to the school office and informed them he had been kidnapped. At first no one believed him. Soon the police were called and Phil was taken to Northwood Hills Elementary where he was reunited with his parents.

Phil's quick thinking to count turns helped him lead the FBI back to the correct motel, where they found that Brad Ogle had used his real name when registering for the motel room. The FBI determined that Brad was indeed the culprit and went to his home in the 6500 block of Dartbrook to arrest him. Brad came to the door with his face splotched with chicken pox, pleading his innocence. A jury eventually saw it differently.

It was a mystery why Brad did the kidnapping. He was married with two young sons and supposedly came from a very well-to-do family in California with several trust funds coming to him. The friendly and popular socialite was also a top athlete and ranked as one of the top T-Bar-M tennis players. Many neighbors were shocked and in disbelief; adamantly saying Brad couldn't have done this. However, it soon surfaced that he had previously been charged with the theft of \$237,500 by false pretext four months prior. Bill remembered seeing Brad come to their boys' games to watch, although Brad didn't have a child on the team. Apparently, he was planning the crime.

His attorney claimed temporary insanity by reason of encephalitis and chicken pox clouding his mind, but the jury determined Ogle was sane and fit to stand trial. Brad Ogle was found guilty. The prosecutor asked for a 99-year prison sentence. Ultimately, Brad was sentenced to 50 years behind bars. About a year later, he pled guilty and was sentenced to 20 more years in prison for the extortion that occurred earlier in 1973. His neighbors didn't really know him after all.

Holiday Crime Prevention

The holidays tend to bring an increase in package theft and BMVs (burglary of motor vehicle). Never leave your car unlocked, and never leave anything of value in it. Also, remind your contractors to lock their vehicles, secure their equipment, or park in driveways to reduce the chance of them becoming a victim.

Crimes of opportunity happen very fast and are often hard to prosecute, so deterrence is our best defense. To reduce the likelihood of falling victim to package theft, here are a couple tips:

- Consider signing up for UPS My Choice and Fedex Delivery Manager. These are free notification programs that inform you when a package is on the way to your location from one of these senders and alerts you once it's been delivered.
- If you're away from home a lot, it may make sense to have your packages delivered to your office, to a relative who is home more often, or to a secure "locker." These are self-service delivery locations that receive your packages and keep them secure until you're ready to retrieve them.
 (Amazon and Fedex are a couple of options for Lockers).
- Check your front porch often and consider a visual doorbell continued page 15

Roll Up Your Sleeves


Are you passionate about Northwood Hills? Want to get involved? Now's your chance.

Beautification Update



Bring Your Bag

Northwood Hills is a dog-friendly neighborhood, and there are many responsible pet owners among us. But, nothing sours your day like finding unexpected dog waste in your yard, your alley trash can, or in your bulk trash pile. If you take your dog for a walk in NWH, first and foremost bring a waste disposal bag! There is a City of Dallas ordinance that requires you to have a disposal bag on hand, and to pick up your animal's waste, so make sure you're prepared. After you do your part to bag the waste, don't make it someone else's problem! Don't leave it in the road, in a neighbor's trash can, or on someone else's bulk trash pile. Waste should be disposed of properly, in your own trash receptacle. We are responsible for being good neighbors and keeping our neighborhood beautiful, so please make sure you're doing your part.



Can 311 Help With That?

NHHA Board Members periodically field calls from residents, asking for help with neighborhood code issues. Since NHHA is a voluntary organization with no enforcement capabilities, we have to defer to the City of Dallas for resolution. But, there's an app for that!

The City of Dallas aims to turn every resident with a smart phone or tablet into a code officer, using an app that allows citizens to photograph and immediately file complaints in the 311 system. In addition to bulk trash violations, citizens can use the app to report high weeds; potholes; litter; a loose animal; obstruction of street, alley or sidewalk; illegal signs; graffiti; illegal dumping and junk vehicles; parking violations; stagnant water; watering violations; and substandard structures.

Download the OurDallas app on your smart phone. You can also call 311 directly or submit an online service request from your computer at https://dallascityhall.com/services/311. Not sure if your issue is covered by 311? Call them and ask!



Real Estate Recap and Real Talk



I'm sure you've heard the buzz from homes sales in North Dallas with "multiple offers, over asking price, sold in less than 24 hours!" to "the market has peaked, prices are dropping, it's a bubble!" With all the hype out there, I get asked every day, "What is really happening and what does it mean for my property in Northwood Hills?" I'm here to tell it to you straight. The following graphic shows data from Q3 2021 vs. Q3 2020. Here's the gist: there's less inventory; prices are solid; # of days on market are shorter.



Fall Check-Up

Northwood Hills is an incredibly beautiful neighborhood, especially in fall. With the winding, tree-lined streets, striking architecture, and friendly neighbors walking with friends, furry and otherwise. To maintain the beauty and the value of our neighborhood, and your home, I recommend doing an informal home inspection. Think of it like an annual physical (you dread it but know it's necessary!). It gives you a general picture of the condition of your property and a game plan for items to address over time. With the crazy winter we just had, here's continued page 12





Oak Wilt Education

The pruning of oak trees should be avoided from February to June and should be performed outside those months only by a licensed arborist using sterilized equipment, proper cuts, and proper sealing of wounds. One of the least hazardous periods for pruning is during the coldest days in midwinter.

Real Estate

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two important items to focus on: First, tree growth - have your trees trimmed every 3 years, as it really pays off when a freeze comes. Second, check the condition of your pipes – older cast iron pipes have a life expectancy of about 50 years, and many homes still have them. Ready for more? Here's a handy checklist.

EXTERIOR

- o Clean gutters and downspouts frequently through fall
- o Check windows and doors for cracks and apply caulking or weather stripping
- o Fertilize lawn
- o Trim shrubs and trees
- o Check dryer vent and clean if necessary
- o Inspect roof, attic and crawlspace for any signs of moisture or damage
- o Remove outdoor hoses, insulate pipes and faucets if necessary
- o Replace lightbulbs

INTERIOR

- o Check smoke detectors and fire extinguishers
- o Repair any loose or damaged windows or door frames
- Inspect furnace and heating system and replace filters
- o Clean air ducts
- o Inspect plumbing; ensure pipes are insulated
- o Donate any unwanted clothing and household items
- o Clean chimney and fireplace
- o Clean baseboards
- o Replace lightbulbs
